YOUR OWN PERSONAL FAMILY HAGGADAH – AND FOR FREE!

How “personalized” to your needs, wants and creativity do you want to celebrate the Passover this year?

“DIY” - Do-It-Yourself is an American tradition, almost as much as “choice” in our lives. Computers have extended our talents and skills incredibly, and now you can provide a Passover Seder for you family and friends with a personalized Haggadah.

Important reasons to create your own Haggadah include, to name just a few, (a) A souvenir that Seder participants can take home with them, which is especially valuable if you have a family “tree” in your work; (b) You can create just what you need for the two nights, which often have different participants, skills and interests if not “time” for the evening; (c) It is an inter-generational learning and family moment creating a Haggadah together, whether parent and child(ren) or grandparent and grandchild(ren) or three generations – or more if you are so fortunate.

Please share with me my joy in choosing one of the following options, and none is intended to be a finished list, just some suggestions:

1. SIMPLE: DOWNLOAD FOR FREE the newest edition of a Haggadah in a PDF that meets most closely your interest from: <http://www.jewishfreeware.org/downloads/>.

All the Haggadot in that site are in Hebrew, English and Transliteration to maximally engage your Seder participants, depending upon their familiarity with the Seder, with Hebrew reading, or just visiting.

These editions in PDF can be printed, copied and shared without limit. But note, please that, nothing may be used for commercial or any form of profit-making endeavor.

Every year I add new PDF “editions” in different degrees of length and sophistication, but they all include the minimum elements of a “kosher,” traditional Seder. Currently only 5768 editions are on-line but the 5769 options will be up soon!

Be sure to download for this option a Haggadah that is marked “NO PAGE NUMBERS” in order that you can paginate the final copy before printing.

How do you make it “yours” and “personal” if it is a PDF, ready to be printed? Possibilities of personalizing a ready-to-go Haggadah include

- (a) Printing and binding it – stapled, 3-hole punched in a loose-leaf binder, “coil,” comb, wire, tape, strip binding or a booklet;
- (b) Create a cover front and back in a heavier weight paper/cardboard, which then can be illustrated, painted, printed;
- (c) Edit the text by removing pages you don't intend to recite at your Seder or adding

- material, readings, or Seder Songs from materials available on-line at my site;
- (d) Create your own contemporary readings, illustrations, cartoons, questions and/or discussion topics which can be inserted where you want to use them;
 - (e) Add a family genealogy for your concluding pages, including digital pictures, family tree, using your preferred genealogy software.
 - (f) The only task is to remember to write in page numbers before you print up your copies for use

2. SIMPLEST: DOWNLOAD FOR FREE and open a posted edition of the Haggadah marked for Davkewriter Platinum 6 Hebrew-English word processor. This software which has a variety of text libraries in Hebrew and English, in addition to a wide variety of supplementary software photo galleries, font galleries, graphics and text handling features.

Because you are opening this download in the word-processor in which these Haggadot were created, you now can edit electronically.

In addition to the suggestions above, additional suggestions include

- (a) Change the Hebrew, the English and/or the Transliteration type faces/styles;
- (b) Change the the type size to meet the needs of different individuals present who may or may not be visually challenged;
- (c) Insert digital material from a camera that you use or from a CD-ROM or any on-line or digital resource;
- (d) Scan materials such as newspaper articles, reports that participants prepare for the Seder, e.g. a comment about one of the Ten Plagues;
- (e) Change the page format using text boxes and borders;
- (f) Use color for the different texts or for emphasis, or to change the background for a page or just a text box;
- (g) Insert instructions at the beginning of the Seder or throughout the entire at each section;
- (h) Insert comments or commentary(ies) in either their own text box, or as footnotes or as endnotes.

3. NOT SO HARD: PRINT BY SECTION ala copier. This is similar to the first option, and editing is more of a challenge – but it works nicely. Download the PDF version of the Haggadah you want and be sure it is marked “Paginated,” meaning that each section of the Haggadah is separated from the one before and after. Thus, you'll have more “white space” if the section is short, or if it is more than one page, it may not be several “full” pages. A little waste of trees, but easy to add and subtract. You can then create intermediate pages in any software you have or prefer.

4. MORE EXPENSIVE BUT... PURCHASE IN MULTIPLE COPIES the published version you prefer. Then download those pages from a Haggadah, the Seder

Song-book, from the various collections of Haggadah Supplementary Readings. Print up sufficient with numbered pages to “insert” into the books you purchase.

5. CUT-AND-PASTE by using a copier – many of us remember the “old technology.” However, you can download and print selectively anything from my website, or materials from newspapers and magazines, downloads from the internet, alternative prayers and readings you want to introduce. Once you have a master, make up the number of copies you need and bind – however.

6. SUPPLEMENTARY HAGGADOT: Every year we purchase newly published or available haggadot to put on the table for people to take, according to their own interests. Then, using the shared, common Haggadah I've prepared, knowing that we are on the “same page” by number, we can have everyone adding to the discussion, comments, questions or songs in addition to whatever is shared from my website.

CAVEAT: You should know that many Haggadot are offered for sale, especially on the internet – in addition to other religious publications and materials – that are intended to be tools for conversion and missionary efforts. They “look Jewish” but affirm the theology and interpretations of other faiths. The Jewish story is interpreted as if it always meant what another faith believes – but it is contrary to traditional Judaism.

7. SEDER SONG BOOK: It's the world's largest Seder Song Book of parodies, traditional hymns and songs. I recommend that you print it up separately and bind it separately unless you want to select the songs and insert them – physically in the finished Haggadah – or as you come to the next part of the table service. Write new songs once you see how many people have developed parodies – and please send them to me

8. BUILD A LIBRARY AND START A COLLECTION: Nothing beats collecting books in my opinion. We have been collecting Haggadot for decades and have literally hundreds – some from the famous supermarket or coffee manufacturers to reprints of famous illuminated medieval manuscripts! Your creativity adds to the world of Haggadot, and collectors like me would LOVE to receive a PDF of your Haggadah.

9. AND if you have read this far, you may want to enter your creation in the HAG HAHAGGADAH: A Creative Festival 5769, in which the rules and ideas and resources are there – first prize in each division is a laptop, and other prizes include Jewish software and books.
